From the President's Desk

hat a month June has been. The markets were pounded and it was free fall of the indices across the spectrum. It was one hectic month, with market fall, rupee depreciation, intervention of RBI, landmark regulations by SEBI, curbs on gold imports by RBI, to ravaging floods in Uttarakhand.

The main question was what triggered this huge fall. From the opinion gathered from the market this fall has been attributed to selling by Foreign Institutional Investors. This data is also correlated by information available in the SEBI's website. One main trigger was the statements by Mr. Ben Bernanke, Chairman of US Federal Reserve. His announcement on 19th June 2013, that FED is planning to pull back its Quantitative Easing (QE) program later this year, sent not only the Indian markets but Global markets into a spin off. However, the points to be Indbank Merchant Banking Services Ltd noted are that, he added that if the US economic numbers don't improve then, the

tapering of QE might not happen. However, from the global spin off we could detect that the second part of his conditional statement was hardly taken into consideration. The impact was so profound, that a host of good macroeconomic developments like revision of India's sovereign rating to "Stable" by Fitch, some landmark legislations by SEBI, the moderate inflation numbers, etc - all failed to check the slide in capital market indices. Further, the Rupee went into a downward spiral touching its all time low of Rs. 60.34 against US dollar due to persistent foreign exchange outflow.

What is Quantitative Easing? We have dealt with the same in our Beginner's Corner. We trust that the information provided will be useful to you. Now, why had funds flown out and what is the reason for the steep depreciation in value of Rupee?

Due to Quantitative Easing, the interest rates in US and Euro Zone are at near Zero level. When the QE is stopped, the interest rates of treasury bills will go up and the investing entities would like to invest there, as these bills are relatively risk free. As to the second question, currency price like other commodities is determined by demand and supply of the particular currency. When the supply increases, the value falls and vice versa. Hence, the fall is more due to the higher demand for dollar rather than over supply of rupee. Will the trend continue? Well, the answer depends on the macro factors.

Summarizing, predicting the course of global events is an uphill task. However, this is the time to hunt for stocks with better valuations. Let's do the same and start our investment plan.

IMPORTANT HAPPENINGS

A. Economic Updates

- 1. RBI leaves the Repo Rate (7.25%), Reverse Repo Rate (6.25%) and Cash Reserve Ratio (4%) unchanged in its Quarterly Review of Monetary Policy held on 17.06.2013.
- 2. BSE and MCX-SX get SEBI's approval for separate Debt Trading Platforms. MCS-SX gets approval for SME Trading Platform. MCX Platform went live from 10th July 2013.
- 3. Commodity Transaction Tax (CTT) comes into effect from July 1, 2013.
- 4. RBI bans import of gold by domestic consumers through Bank credit and makes the overseas purchase a cash and carry business. Further, the Government of India hiked the import duty to 8% from the current 6%. However the base for imposing import duty on gold has been reduced from \$459 to \$421 per 10 gram.
- The 1st tranche of Inflation Indexed Bonds subscribed more than 4 times. Moody's terms the launch as a "radical policy adjustment". Auction of 2nd tranche of bonds worth Rs. 1000 Cr. maturing in 2023 conducted on 25.06.2013.
- RBI imposes a fine of Rs. 5 Cr. on Axis Bank, Rs. 4.5 Cr. on HDFC Bank and Rs. 1 Cr. on ICICI Bank for violation of KYC norms.
- 7. Fitch upgrades India's outlook to "Stable".

B. Regulatory Updates

- 8. SEBI notifies Regulations for Issuance and Listing of Non-Convertible Redeemable Preference Shares.
- 9. To make OFS more attractive, SEBI has allowed employees of Public Sector Undertakings the option to subscribe upto 5% of the issue size at a discount.
- 10. SEBI makes it compulsory for investment advisors and their associated persons to get the requisite certifications to operate in Stock Markets.
- 11. SEBI cuts the timeline for carrying out an OFS. Companies can announce the offer just a day ahead of the proposed buy-back.
- 12. According to SEBI, 105 firms have failed to meet the minimum public shareholding norms set by SEBI. The promoters and directors of such companies are barred from accessing capital markets and their voting rights and corporate benefits freezed.
- 13. SEBI gets the power to analyze the call details of the entities under its scanner.
- 14. SEBI notifies tightened Buyback Regulations, introduces uniform entry norms for existing FIIs, Sub Accounts and Qualified Foreign Investors, by combining them into a single category called Foreign Portfolio Investor (FPI).
- 15. SEBI allows start-up companies and small and medium enterprises to list themselves on Institutional Trading Platform (ITP) without having to come out with an IPO. This would allow investors of startups to exit and would also make it easier for new investors to come on board. They have also been exempted from "Minimum Public Shareholding" norm.
- 16. SEBI has allowed entities to apply for setting up of Single Self Regulatory Organization (SRO) for Mutual Fund Distributors.

Beginner's Corner

QUANTITATIVE EASING (QE)

Quantitative Easing is an oft repeated term used in various communication channels in the recent months. In, this issue we throw some light on QE. However, before we deal with QE, let's have a look at the monetary policy followed by Central Banks and their impact.

What is Monetary Policy? Monetary Policy is the process by which the monetary authority of a country, generally the Central Bank, controls the quantitative supply of money in the economy and regulates key interest rates with the objectives of propelling growth while maintaining price stability (both domestic price stability by way of controlling inflation and external price stability by way of exchange rate management) and financial stability.

The tools used by RBI to execute the same are Quantitative and/or Qualitative:

1. QUANTITATIVE TOOLS:

Open Market Operations: It is the process of buying and selling of Government Securities/ Corporate Bonds from or to public. RBI sells Eligible Securities/Bonds to reduce liquidity in the banking system and thereby the flow of credit. Conversely, RBI buys Securities/ Bonds to augment liquidity in the system and increase the flow of credit by banks. Cash Reserve Ratio (CRR): Broadly, it is the percentage of bank deposits which banks are required to keep in their Current Account with the Reserve Bank of India (RBI). Higher the CRR, lower will be the liquidity in the banking system and to that extent their capacity of credit creation is

<u>Statutory Liquidity Ratio</u>: Every Scheduled Bank has to maintain certain percentage of its total time and demand liabilities as liquid assets in prescribed form like Cash Balance, Eligible Securities/Bonds at any point of time. The ratio of such liquid assets to time and demand liabilities is the Statutory Liquidity Ratio.

reduced. Opposite is the case with lowering of CRR.

Bank Rate: Bank Rate is the rate of interest charged by RBI for providing funds or loans to the banking system. Funds are provided either through direct lending or buying/re-discounting of money market instruments like commercial papers and treasury bills. Increase in Bank Rate increases the cost of borrowing by banks, which in turn results in decreased money supply and reduction in volume of bank credit. Increase in Bank Rate is a dear money policy measure by RBI. Vice versa is true when the Bank Rate is decreased.

<u>Credit Ceiling</u>: RBI issues instructions to banks enforcing guidelines/limits on lending to certain sectors.

Repo Rate: Repo Rate is the rate at which RBI lends to banks against Eligible Securities as collaterals. Any decrease in repo rate increases the liquidity as the banks will be able to get money at cheaper rates. Similarly increase in Repo rate decreases the liquidity in the system.

<u>Reverse Repo Rate</u>: Reverse Repo Rate is the rate at which banks park their surplus funds as deposits with RBI. Increase in Reverse Repo Rate decreases the money flow in the markets and vice versa.

2. QUALITATIVE TOOLS: These are RBI's Moral Suasions, guidelines/clarifications on policy measures, direct actions like imposing penalty for non-adherence to policy guidelines etc.

Using these tools RBI controls the availability of money and credit and thus "INFLATION". Higher inflation lowers country's export competitiveness as goods become expensive for other countries resulting in decreased demand for the rupee, which in turn leads to depreciation in value of rupee. Similarly, higher interest rate attracts foreign investor which increases the demand for rupee, resulting in appreciation in value of rupee.

What is Quantitative Easing? The process of a Central Bank buying assets and pumping liquidity into the economy is known as "Quantitative Easing". The goal of this policy is to increase the money supply rather than to decrease the interest rate, which cannot be decreased further.

Quantum of QE in G4 countries: In the aftermath of financial crisis of 2008, mainly, the USA, the European Union, Japan and UK (known as the G4 countries) have released unprecedented quantum of liquidity into their banking system (through purchase of eligible assets/securities) to stimulate their economy by encouraging higher credit and consumption, which in turn is expected to increase their employment level and trade flows. The asset of G4 Central Banks reportedly expanded from \$3.5 trillion (1000 billion = 1 trillion) in 2007 to \$9 trillion presently and still rising. The present level represents 23% of their GDP from about 12% in the pre-crisis period. In the USA alone, the Federal Reserve has reportedly over \$2 trillion of treasury notes now compared to about \$800 billion in the pre-crises period. In the latest round of QE3 (3rd phase of Quantitative Easing), the FED proposes to purchase \$40 billion of mortgage backed assets per month as long as their unemployment level remains above 6.5%.

Impact of QE: Since interest rates in the G4 economies remain at near Zero level and their economies remain stagnant, capital from these economies flow into emerging economies like India in search of higher risk-adjusted returns. It is estimated that about 1/3 of the increase in the US monetary base in the QE1 and QE2 phases leaked out in the form of increased growth of capital outflows and most of the capital flew to emerging economies in the form of portfolio investments which are prone to sudden and volatile movements as witnessed in Indian bourses recently. Because, the moment the QE is halted in US and/or interest rate in USA rises and/or the growth rate in US economy picks up, the volatile money in Indian bourses will flow back to USA, resulting in higher demand for dollar/ depreciation of rupee and unpredictable volatility in Indian bourses. Moreover, lured by very low interest rates of foreign currencies, Indian corporate with eligible credit ratings, borrow abroad at comparatively cheaper rates and bring in the foreign currency loan funds into India, leading to increased money supply in India. But, these borrowing corporate are exposed to unexpected changes in the interest rates in borrowing currencies and exchange rate volatility during the currency of their borrowing arrangement. Thus, the overall impact of this capital inflow is expansionary, inflationary and distortionary.
